Shahid Ahmed is Professor at Department of Economics and Director of the Centre for Jawaharlal Nehru Studies, Jamia Millia Islamia, New Delhi. He has previously served in United Nations Conference on Trade and Development (UNCTAD) India Programme during 2006-09 with progressively increasing responsibilities as Consultant, Economist, and Senior Economist.

He has been teaching economics in the Department for more than 19 years and supervising MPhil and PhD scholars in the field of trade and development. He has published widely in the areas of trade, development, finance, regional trading blocs and WTO-related issues. His present research broadly deals with development issues, international economics, applied econometrics and general equilibrium modelling.



Shesadri Banerjee is an Associate Fellow at NCAER. He also worked as Professor and Head of the Agricultural Economics Unit at Institute of Economic Growth (IEG), Delhi, and Professor of Agricultural Marketing at Punjab Agricultural University, Ludhiana. He has worked as a consultant for FAO, UNDP, ESCAP, and World Bank and served in several high level committees of Government of India. Ramesh holds a PhD in Agricultural Economics from the Indian Agricultural Research Institute, Delhi.



Rajesh Chadha is Senior Fellow and Research Counsellor at NCAER. He has been a Visiting Scholar at the Universities of Michigan and Melbourne. His areas of specialization include CGE modelling, international trade, FDI, agricultural markets and competition and regulatory reforms. He received his PhD in Economics from the Indian Institute of Technology, New Delhi.

He is the co-developer of the ORANI and MONASH models of the Australian economy and the USAGE model of the U.S. economy. His publication list contains about 200 articles and 8 books. He is a Distinguished Fellow of the Economic Society of Australia.



Bishwanath Goldar is the ICSSR National Fellow at the Institute of Economic Growth. Previously, he was a Professor of Economics at the Institute of Economic Growth and a member of the National Statistical Commission. He is also the Chairman of the Standing Committee on Industrial Statistics (CSO) and of the Committee on Producer Price Index. He specializes in industrial economics and international trade. He has also undertaken studies on the environmental aspects of Indian industries including the impact of environmental management practices on profitability and market value of Indian industrial firms, and studies on energy use efficiency, carbon emissions and carbon trading in the context of Indian manufacturing industries. He holds a PhD from University of Delhi and MA in Economics from Delhi School of Economics.



Jyoti Gujral currently heads Quest Advisory which specialises in infrastructure & agriculture. Formerly, as Director, IDFC she has extensive experience in leading PPP capacity building, research and transactions at state, national and international levels.
